## WESTERN TRIP

Decisive Victories Over Michigan and W. V. U. Rain Spoiled the Pitt Game. Skemp Shows Rare Form.

Iwo victories out of three games played is the record of our nine on the first far-western trip it ever took. West Virginia was downed 12 to 1 on Wednesday May nine teenth; we lost to Notre Dame 9 to 0 two days later; and then last Saturday came our glorious triumph over Michigan 9 to 7.

## PUSHBALL.

A New Interclass Scrap Proposed to Take the Place of the Old Picture Scrap and Campus Rush.

The following set of rules for the proposed pushball contest between underclassmen was passed upon almost unanimously by the upper two classes recently and is now before the student council for final ratification. The abandonment, last fall, of the campus rush, and the unsatisfactory condition of affairs always accompanying the picture scrap, brought the student body to a realization that something ought to be done to restore and maintain good old class spirit among the lower classes, and at the same time eliminate any danger to life or property. The idea of a pushball game will prove excellent, without a doubt, for there is always intense excitement produced at one of these games. A large ball constructed in a similar way to a football is used, but it is spherical and six feet in diameter. The object of each side is to keep the ball in the air and try to get it over their enemies' heads and thereby into their territory. The money required for the bail, about \$200, is to be secured by a popular subscription which Dr. Sparks has already started.

By setting the date for this scrap as the second Saturday of the school year and recommending a later date for the wrestling match, the committee intend to have a series of scraps which will be very beneficial to each class.
