COLLEGE NOTES.

At a recent, faculty meeting the question of the interpretation of the rules of attendance was considered and it was agreed that no student should be excluded from a class without warning and without the consent of the head of the department in which the subject is taught and the dean of the school in which the student is registered; it was also agreed that a student excluded from a class, who fails to be reinstated or have his schedule rearranged within three scholastic days will be dropped from all classes; it was also agreed that a student who absents himself from a class permanently places himself in serious breach of college discipline, and that a zero grade should be assigned for absence from class without satisfactory excuse. Excuse for absence from class caused by a student's being away from the college must be approved by the Dean of the school in which the student is enrolled.

Philip G. Gossler '90, who has been vice president of the J. G. White Company, is now associated with the well known banking house of A. B.
