

A New Field.

In view of the increased demands made in recent years by the colleges and universities upon the preparatory and high schools for more and better German work as an entrance requirement, a summer school in Germany has been organized. This is under the management of Professor Carl D. Fehr, Head of the German Department of the Pennsylvania State College. The party, consisting of thirteen teachers from as many schools of this state and New York, will sail June 23, will be distributed among the German families where only German is spoken, will be under the instruction of German masters three hours daily for six weeks, and finally will devote ten days to touring through the most interesting parts of Germany. Among those cooperating with Professor Fehr is the President of the Modern Language Association of Saxony and contributor to the School Review of Chicago University.

COLLEGE NOTES.

President Sparks was a guest at the annual dinner of the Medico-Chirurgical college, given on Friday, June 4th, at the Bellevue Stratford, Philadelphia. On Thursday, June 3, he delivered the Commencement address before the graduates of the Montrose High school; and on Wednesday, June 9, he performed the same function at Lebanon Valley college, Annsville, Pennsylvania.

Professor F. L. Pattee is to publish this fall from the press of Eaton and Mains a book entitled "Elements of Religious Pedagogy." It will be a work of some 400 pages and will be divided into three parts: Child Study, Psychology, and the Art of Teaching. The work has already been adopted as a text book by the International Sunday School Union.

At a meeting of the Faculty Committee on Student Organizations and Publications held May 17, 1909, it was voted that the following policy be adopted with reference to students taking part in public performances, the same to go into effect for the next college year: Managers of student organizations that intend to give public performances shall be requested to send to the Faculty Committee on Student Organizations and Publications, before rehearsals for such performances are begun, a list of the candidates for the various parts. The names of these students shall then be sent to their respective deans. Each dean, after investigating their scholarship record, shall report back to the Committee who, upon receipt of this information, shall then report back to the manager."
