The Commencement drill on Monday morning will be the last drill under the supervision of Captain Hay. For four years he has been the commandant of cadets, detailed from the regular service to carry out the law for instruction in military tactics in the land grant colleges. Those who have had contact with him and his work during these years could not fail to be impressed with his earnestness, and his devotion to duty, arduous though it surely was at times.

When Captain Hay took charge of the department, he was surrounded by all the difficulties of a new position, and it was soon evident from the tactful way in which he handled the situation that here was the man with a real interest in the work and the conditions of working.

Captain Hay has ever been the exponent of the square deal, as long as the students gave him one in return. A man without malice toward a single man, in ranks or out, he has won a place in the hearts of all, and a stauncher friend to the fellow in trouble, who came to him and truthfully stated his case, could not be found.

During his term here other duties than those pertaining to military work have been turned over to him to handle. The manner in which he took charge of and straightened out the records of Chapel attendance, and gymnasium drill records, and
