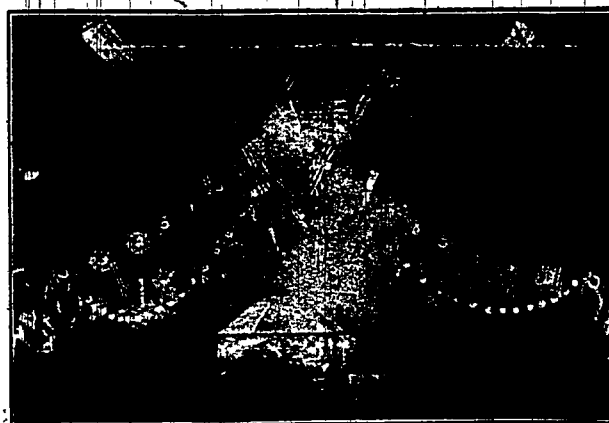
All-Star Class Team vs. Varsity.
