three periods of ten minutes each, the object of each class being to push the ball into the enemy's terrritory.
Sec. 3. The judges shall announce the end of each period by means of tome previously arranged signal.

Sec.4. If the ball is pushed uut of bounds the referee shall put it in play twenty-five yards inside the boundary by posting the classes in a manner similar to that at the start.

ARTICLE VI
Intermission between periods shall continue for five minutes.

## ARTICLE YII

At the end of each period the side that has the ball in the enemy's territory shall score one point. The class that, scores the greater number of poirfits shall win the scrap.

ARTICLE VIII
Sec. 1. The referee shall be a member of the faculty or an alumnus of the college who has been graduated at least three years.
Sec. 2. The judges shall consist of the Junior and Senior class presidents and one other, (a member of the faculty or an alumnus) chosen by them. Aside from choosing and laying out the field the judges shall have charge of cynbtruing these rules and making temporary rules to cover unforseen circumstances.
Sec. 3. The judges' shall select ten members from each of the upper classes to oversee the scrap and enforce fair play.

ARTICLE IX
Athletes in training may or may not enter the scrap as they, the coach and the Physical Director decide.

The students of the University of Maine went on strike last week because they were asked to sign a pledge to cease all hazing. The strike terminated after a few days when each side made concessions to the other. As a result, hazing is to be continued but no serious injury of any nature múst be inflicted.
The pushball which was ordered last week is due here on Friday. All the money has been obtained and everything is ready for a scrap on Saturday if the ball comes. The time will be before the football game at a place to be decided by the judges.
