Mr. Patterson is a fine example, indeed one of the very finest, of the truth, that, if a man will use and not abuse the common sense with which God has endowed him he can make the daily business and duties of life equal, in time, the privileges of the lecture room and the university, in bringing out of himself and to the public gaze and admiration all the qualities which are noblest in men, and most, necessary to the faithful service of our fellows. A few men, and but a few, have rendered the college conspicuous service during the first half century or more of its history. Mr. Patterson was one of those few. Among these he might, without exaggeration be called *primus inter pares* and it is safe to say that many a decade will intervene before any other man will make here so all-round and so complete a record. His is an example worthy of our emulation and will, no doubt, for many years, prove the seed of an abundant and profitable fruit.

#### Five New Fellowships Established.

At the last meeting of the Executive committee of the Board of Trustees the following action was taken:

As an aid and incentive to young men and women to fit themselves for the teaching profession, there shall be established five Instructional Fellowships of the value of \$600 each, one to be assigned to each school by a Board consisting of the faculty of the school and the President of the college. Every applicant must have received a Bachelor's degree from an institution of good repute. Appointments shall be made for one year only and not renewed unless for unusual cause and by unanimous vote of the appointing Board.

The holder of the Fellowships shall perform such service in instruction and otherwise as the Dean of his school may direct and shall make a report in writing to the dean at least every three months of the individual work he is undertaking for himself.

### THE FIRST VICTORY

#### Grove City Defeated by Same Score as Last Year.

By exactly the same score with which Captain McCleary's eleven "took over" Grove City College last fall, captain Vorhis's team won from the Western Pennsylvanians last Saturday in the first game of football played on the new Beaver Field gridiron. It was a contest similar to last year's in many respects; we got the same number of touchdowns in both games and the visitors played the same kind of plucky football.

The announcement by coach Hollenback of the lineup which started the Grove City game was received with much satisfaction and the White and Blue played a fast, but by no means flawless, game throughout. Watson was particularly good in his hard, low tackles and "Dick" Smith in his end runs, on which he always threw off

several tacklers and made appreciable gains. Hermann, McCleary, Hirshman and Captain Vorhis composed a backfield which has fought valiantly for the White and Blue in at least half a dozen battles and this combination was up to its old tricks of helpful aggressiveness and sturdy defense.

The first half ended 22 to 0, but we could score only one touchdown by McCleary and one field goal by Larry Vorhis the second period. Numerous substitutions were made after the second half had started and a number of the new men showed up well. Very, the Mercersburg end, who commenced the contest, made a decidedly favorable impression; he was the only player in the initial lineup who had not seen more or less service on the varsity previous to this year. At the other end Brown took care of several forward passes in grand style, and the shift of Alex Gray from center to guard appeared to work well.

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
