Grouse and pheasants from Oct. 15 to Dec. 1; five in one day.

Ouall from Oct. 15 to Nov. 15 10

in a day and 75 in a season.

Wild turkey, Oct 15 to Dec. 1, one

in a day, two in a season.

Squirrels, Oct. 15 to Dec. 1; six in a day.

Rabbits, Nov. 1 to Dec. 15; 10 in a day.

Deer, Nov. 15 to Dec. 1, one male deer with horns in season.
