

squirrels and wild turkey, however, are not increasing very rapidly. The following are the open seasons and the number of birds or animals that can be killed in one day:

Bear, from Oct. 1 to Jan. 1; no limit.

Woodcock, from Oct. 1 to Dec. 1; 10 in one day.

Grouse and pheasants from Oct. 15 to Dec. 1; five in one day.

Quail from Oct. 15 to Nov. 15; 10 in a day and 75 in a season.

Wild turkey, Oct 15 to Dec. 1, one in a day, two in a season.

Squirrels, Oct. 15 to Dec. 1; six in a day.

Rabbits, Nov. 1 to Dec. 15; 10 in a day.

Deer, Nov. 15 to Dec. 1, one male deer with horns in season.

**College Enrollment.**

The band, thirty strong, will be on the trip with lots of musical noise and it will lead us on our various "peperades." Not a single student should miss this game as the good time in Wilkesbarre is well worth the trip, even setting aside the game, which is well worth going miles to see. Last night tickets for the special train were on sale at the mass meeting and later at the Athletic store; today they can be secured at the Athletic store from 3 to 5 p. m. and after the mass meeting until 9 p. m., as well as at that gathering. Announcement of the time for the final sale of tickets tomorrow morning will be made tonight when we gather in Old chapel to give our final cheer and sing our final song before the crowd gets together again at Wilkesbarre. The struggle itself will be held at the spacious Driving Park where one stand accommodating a thousand spectators has been set aside for the loyal rooters from Old Penn State. Let your only sentiment be, "I will meet you in the State stand," for we are all going to be there and the only thing lost will be our voices for a temporary period. Its a good cause, too, for our fellows are out to win and when State sets her mind on something she is pretty likely to get it!
