of the class fund. He writes that the balance from '09's damage fund, together with the money in the treasury, amounted to eight hundred and fifteen dollars. If in the next five years a fund is started for the socalled Atherton Hall. the aforesaid money will be turned over to the proper authorities for a contribution to the said building fund. If, however, no such demand is made, the money will be held until '09 "reunes" in 1914, when a vote shall be taken as to how the money is to be spent.

In the meantime, Mr. Furst has accepted the personal note of John T. Manson, President of the Yale National Bank of New Haven, for eight hundred dollars, interest at 5 percent, and has accepted conservative collateral securities for the same, having a face value of nine hundred dollars, but worth at the present time eleven hundred dollars.


## Band Concert a Success.
