

FIRST HALF

Punts—Penn 7 for 316 yards, an average of 45 yards each; State 12 for 482 yards, an average of 40 yards each.

Penalties—Penn 3 for a total of 25 yards; State 5 for a total of 70 yards.

Punts—Penn 5 for a total of 173 yards, an average of 34 yards each; State 5 for a total of 192 yards, an average of 38 yards each.

Kick Offs—Penn 1 for 55 yards; State 2 for a total of 80 yards.
