DEAN CRANE'S PAPER

Read Before the Institution of Mining Engineers in London Last May.

Dean Crane had the honor of addressing the Institution of Mining Engineers in London on May 28 last. He presented a paper entitled "The Use of Concrete for Mine Support," which treated the subject from many points of view and received very favorable criticism. The fact that Dean Crane presented details of the extent of the use of concrete in the United States was important in itself as conditions vary somewhat in the old World.

In taking up the discussion Dean Crane brought out the need of some substitute for timoer in mine support, and showed the advantages of the use of concrete. He treated the various characters of cements, and the proportions, in the mixtures for use under different classes of work. He compared the cost for work under each class, such as foundation walls, retaining walls, dams, etc. Het bidught; out the methods of reinforced! work. Then, going on he showed the applications of concrete, as used in shaft lining, lining of dritts and gangways, and stoppings and over casts. The use of concrete for stringers in inclined shatts was shown to be eminently successful.

In concluding his paper Deari Crane said, "Having reluctantly tried and found that concrete is good, strong, durable and reliable, American engineers are wont to go

a step further and reduce both the amount and cost. They are, therefore, turning to ferro-concrete, which will undoubtedly work as great a revolution in methods of construction as did the introduction of plain concrete. Further improvements may confidently be expected, both in the character of the ingredients and in the application of concretes, thus fulfilling the prediction of the ultimate and universal application of concrete lumber."

The president of the Institution moved a hearty vote of thanks to the author for his valuable paper, and the vote was carried by acclamation.
