Below the grandstand and in front of it is the State cheering section which will accommodate about 1000 men with good big voices. The 75 boxes reserved are on top of the grandstand and one can be secured at almost any part of the field. The grandstand seats are \$1.50 apiece and the box seats \$2.00 In a few days the general admission tickets can be secuted here from Manager McKee for fifty cents; the price at the field in Pittsburg for this section will be \$1.00.
