Improvements in the Electrical

Prominent among the many improvements in and about the college, is the renovation of the electrical laboratories in the engineering annex. The upper floor has been transformed from drawing sooms to electrical shops and the appliances are all new and of the most recent types of manufacture. Order has been placed by the faculty for a new motor generator set, consisting of a twelve H. P. D. C compound mo tor coupled to a 7 1 2 Kilowatt A. C. three phase generator. There is also pending shipment, a Westinghouse three phase induction mo.cr equipped with collector rings for inserting resistances in the secondary circuit, and a 15 kilowatt three phase A. C generator, terminals of the three phases brought out of machine for stan and mesh connections.
