Princeton, Cornell and Ohio State on Our Schedule for the First Time. Basketball Now Under Way With Some Promising New Candidates.

Varsity basketball practice began last Monday evening with the following old men on the floor: Captain Hermann, Reed, Blythe, Hoerie and James. There are several promising candidates from the freshman class, also. The outlook for a good team this year is very promising, and, indeed, it must be so for the schedule is a hard one. There are seventeen games on the schedule as announced by Manager Summer, subject to possible changes. There are several points in the schedule this year, which are worthy of notice. For instance, instead of two trips besides the Bucknell game, the varsity will take an extra trip to Ithaca to play Cornell, whom we have never met before on the basketball floor. This game will be one of the main events at Ithaca during Cornell's Senior Week festivities. Among the other new games we find contests with Ohio State and Princeton, both of which should be valuable additions to our schedule. INTERCLASS BASKETBALL

The Newly Organized League Has Adopted a Constitution—Schedule Begins on December First.

The newly organized interclass basketball league is now well under way. It is modeled after the interclass baseball league, but it should be of more benefit to the student body because basketball comes at a time of the year when things are more or less dead around State College. The constitution of the new organization is as follows:

Article I. All members of a class who do not belong to the varsity basketball squad shall be eligible to the class teams.

Article II. Members of a class are those so ranked in the college lists.

Article III. Each class shall equip and maintain its own team.

Article IV. Each class shall be scheduled for three games to be played with each other.

Article V. The class having the highest percentage of victories shall be entitled to the championship.

Article VI. The schedule shall be arranged by a committee composed of the varsity manager and managers of the respective class teams.

Article VII. This schedule committee shall choose as referees a number of men not belonging to any of the contesting classes. The managers of the two teams engaged
