At a meeting of the Board of Trustees held November 19, 1909, the following actions were taken:

Milton S. McDowell, Assistant Professor of Experimental Agricultural Chemistry, was made Assistant Professor of Agricultural Extension.

C. L. Goodling was appointed Superintendent of Farms, beginning December 1, 1909.

The erection of greenhouses for the proposed horticultural building as part of the Agricultural Group was authorized.

The establishment of a Course in Milling in the School of Engineering was authorized.

The School of Engineering was permitted to erect two buildings for the use of the Engineering Experiment Station.

A firm in New York City was permitted to make a bird's-eye-view of the campus and buildings of the college similar to those made for other institutions.

Charles E. Govier was advanced in rank from Instructor to Assistant Professor of Telephone Engineering.

R. S. Fridy was appointed to the rank of Instructor in Engineering.

D. A. Isenberg was made an Assistant in Engineering.

A vote of thanks was tendered the brick manufacturers at Clearfield who contributed the brick for paving the entrance to the grounds.

The new veterinary building of the University of Pennsylvania has been completed and is now being occupied. Courses in public health have also been started.
