Art Robinson and Richards had to work to get an advance of two yards each. Then Richards kicked a high punt which hit Very on the head but the officials would not allow McCleary's run of twelve yards to stand after he had recovered the ball. That must have angered Bull for he "began to smile" and tore off twenty-two yards around Roe's end. Hirshman got five yards and Mauthe two but on a fake play which proved to be a double pass Mauthe lost a first down by only four inches.

Galvin punted poorly and Vorhis recovered the ball on a high bounce by jumping into the air above the heads of four or five players. McCleary made five yards and Hirshman got seven off tackle; "Heff" played one of the greatest games of his career all through and was about as hard to stop as a battering ram.

Pitt was penalized five yards for offside and McCleary made seven; then Bull added five more on two downs, but Pitt, through wonderful defensive play secured the ball on their 2-yard line on downs.

Larry caught Richard's punt on Pitt's 40-yard line and ran back five yards. Hirshman went through tackle for sixteen yards when he collided with umpire Kelly, but he kept on going until his run totalled up to twenty-two yards. To many it looked as though he would have scored but for the unfortunate ac-

cident, yet State was not now to be denied.

Smith got four yards. Hirshman added eight and the ball was within six yards of the coveted mark. Mauthe made it four and the uproar made by the multitude of Blue and White rooters must have been heard all the way back to State College when McCleary squeezed over the line for the only touchdown of the game. Piddlet kicked out nicely and Vorhis "heeled" the punt directly

in front of the goal posts, but Mauthe's try for goal from touch-down went under the bar. Such was the story of the only score made in the game and as such it was the story of the game for after that Old State relied more on defensive tactics than before. The touchdown was probably the hardest we made this fall but had another score been necessary there are few who doubt that the Nittany Lion could have mustered the power to get it.
