A strong nucleus of the '05 eleven returned to school—Vorhis, McCleary, Hirshman, Gray, Smith, Weaver, Piollet, Watson, Johnson, Hermann, Brown, Riddle and Harlow, while Mauthe, Very, Engle, Barrett, Klepfer, Doster, Rogers,

Lesh, Estep, Arnold, Boudon, Hansen, Goedecke, Keller, Patrick and Tunnington showed themselves to be more or less deserving of varsity honors also. In bringing the squad around into the winning form it displayed through the entire season, the help of "Hennie" Scholl '01 was especially good, and the services of George McGee '07, "Johnnie" Gotwals '07, "Saundie" Saunders '05 and "Pud" Read '92 were loyally tendered at opportune times.
