Then Gereva was smothered 40 to 0 on New Beaver Field on October sixteenth. This was but a practice game preparatory to the Penn contest at Philadelphia a week later. Here our valiant gridiron heroes played the Quakers to a standstill as the final score of 3 to 3 well shows. The likeable and competent? Hollenback was not over anxious' to see his alma mater defeated on Frank-

tin Field and coached our eleven chiefly for a defensive game, but the result was highly satisfactorv since we tied Old Penn on the griditon for the first time in history. "Larry" Vorhis's field goal at the proper moment reminded one of his work at Cornell in ' 07 when the Ithacans were defeated 8 to 6 by his trusty toe, and the ' 08 Pittsburg victory when "Larry" kicked three field goals.

Following the Penn tie, I afayctte refused to play us under any conditlons on October thirtieth and both elevens remained idle. Then came the 33 to 0 triumph bver Bucknell and the 40 to 0 victory over West Vinginia the worst beatings ever admnistered to these riyals.

On Thankspiving Day the season was ended in a blaze df glory at Pittsburg where the best eleven Pitt ever had was defeated 5 to 0 . But for a muddy ald old State would have
scored an even greater victory to all appearances, yet that triumph was enough to bring back to State College, the Spaiding Silver football trophyland to bring tol the foot of Mount Nittany the joy and gladness that must accompany the most successful football season Old State has ever experienced.
