#### Y. M. C. A. Notes.

The sixth international convention of the Student Volunteer Movement meets in Rochester, N. Y. Dec. 29 1909 to Jan. 2 1910. The convention will consist of representative students from 700 of the leading colleges and universities of the United States and Canada, with delegates from foreign student centers. Representation is limited according to the student population.

These conventions are held about once in every four years. The last one, in 1906, was held in Nashville, Tenn. with nearly 5000 delegates in attendance. This is the largest student gathering in the world, and is composed of the leaders of every phase of college life.

The convention will be addressed by diplomats, financiers and such student leaders as Speer and Mott.

Men from the West are coming in special cars.

A recent article in the Public Ledger said: The Student Volunteer convention in Rochester, a few weeks hence, will do more for the few thousand college students who will attend than any single course in their regular studies; for it will give them an imperial vision of the world and of their life work.

#### Walter Camp's Honor List of Football.

Contrary to his annual custom of selecting an All-American football team, Walter Camp, in the January "Outing," contents himself with choosing an "Honor List of 1909 Football."

While, with the exception of a few cases, it would be very simple to pick out Mr. Camp's selection for an All-American team, the fact that he departed from his annual custom has pointed out very strongly to some critics that there is to be a reform in football.

In his "Honor List of 1909 Football" Mr. Camp places seven Yale men on the roll. In direct contrast there are no Cornell or Penn State men to be found there. On the other hand, Notre Dame, for the first time in many years, is honored by having three of her players recognized.
