THE EASTERN TRIP.

One Victory and Three Defeats. Faculty Disapproves of the Next Trip. Wyoming Seminary Tomorrow Night.

Our weakened basketball five won but one out of four games on the first annual eastern journey. Ross, Hoerle and James did not accompany the team while Hermann's ankle bothered him so much that he was unable to play a full game on the entire trip. Yet the Blue and White tossers fought valiantly and pluckily to the very end of every contest.

At Pennsylvania where our men wished a victory more than anywhere else, the final tally was 23 to 17 against us. The shooting of Saxe, one of Penn's forwards, was really the cause of State's downfall, but as in the other two games lost on the trip our aggregation would probably have won had it been able to show its strongest front. Blythe played well and our men worked hard for a victory that was not forthcoming.

Following the Penn game Old State came back strong the next day and won from the sturdy Pratt Institute five by the score of 24 to 19. This was what the players designated to be the most bitterly fought game on the whole trip and much credit must be given Captain Hermann's tossers for their good showing against the Brooklyn school. Shore starred in this game while Reed and Haddow worked in their usual consistent style.

When our basketball team met Columbia in New York on Dec. 17,

it was the first time the Gothamites had ever been pitted against Penn State in any branch of sport. The Blue and White, of our opponents came out triumphant over our own Blue and White by a score of 19 to 13, but Columbia had to play its best game to win. The Columbia team is one of the strongest college fives this year and it is to be regretted that everyone of our varsity men could not have had a chance against it as the feeling seems to be that we could have downed the New Yorkers.

Tired, but still fighting, our team lost a heartbreaking game to West Point on Saturday the eighteenth, when McKinney shot the winning goal just as the whistle sounded to end the second half of the final game on the trip. Hermann's four baskets prove that he was in his old-time shooting form and his teammates fought well for the little leader only to lose out at the last minute. Again and again flashes of fast teamwork were shown in the West Point game as well as in the other games of the trip and we should find Old State finishing the season on top as usual.

Last Friday's game with Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute had to be cancelled as was that with Ohio State for the twenty-first of this month. Tomorrow Wyoming Seminary plays our five on the Armory floor and next Thursday the Pittsburg Collegians appear here. The faculty has tabooed the final eastern trip at the end of February when Bucknell, Harrisburg A. C., Dickinson, Princeton and Swarthmore were to have been played. It is probable
