COLLEGE NOTES.

A new college bulletin was issued recently devoted to the Summer Session for Teachers. The director of the session is Mr. C. D. Koch. He has received the degrees of A. B. and A. M. from Bucknell University and has been a graduate student at Columbia. He was selected by Dr. Schaffer to be one of the two state high school inspectors and has served in that capacity for three years, making him especially fitted for the work he is to undertake here.

"The Food Supply of the Future" is the title of Dr. Armsby's recent address to the annual meeting of the American Society of Animal Nutrition, of which Society he is president, held in Chicago last November. The address was published in Science, N. S. for December 10, and is reprinted as one of the bulletins from the Department of Agriculture. It is a very interesting and instructive address.

The trip took a southward course to London, and then went westward to Portsmouth, showing as it went along the most important and interesting points. Among the motion pictures the review at Aldershot and the launching at Portsmouth stand out as especially worthy of notice.

The entire lecture was of the highest class and it is with great pleasure that we look forward to the next one of the course.
