English Literature 6, Poetics, 2 hours, Instructor, Mr. Dye; English Literature 7, Middle English, 4 hours, Instructor, Professor Espenshade; English Literature 8, Early English Literature, 4 hours, Instructor, Professor Pattee; English Literature 11, The Classical and Romantic Periods, 4 hours, Instructor, Mr. Jones; English Literature 12, The Victorian Era, 4 hours, Instructor, Mr. Dye; English Literature 17, The Literature of the Period of Queen Anne, 2 hours, Instructor, Mr. Curl; English Literature 20, The English Essay, 3 hours, Instructor, Professor Frizzell; English Literature 22, The Poetry of Browning and Tennyson, 2 hours, Instructor, Professor Crockett.

Notes From Agricultural Hill.

The State Grange meeting which was held here at the college from Dec 21 to 24 was a great affair in every sense of the word. Over 1500 people were present and everybody was pleased with the College and the treatment accorded them. Some of the exhibits were especially interesting. Wednesday afternoon was given over to a general inspection of the college buildings and was thoroughly enjoyed by the visitors. Mortimer Whitehead, for many years a lecturer of the National Grange, was the guest of honor.

The Farmers' Week was the most successful of the four which have been held here. Over 100 lectures were delivered on various agricultural topics and five hundred and fifty-two visitors were present. The Horticultural and Agronomy exhibits were especially fine this year. A poultry show was held in the Armory, having fowls from Bellefonte, Williamsport, and Lewistown entered.

The fifty-first annual meeting of the State Horticultural Association of Pennsylvania is to be held Jan. 11, 12, and 13, at Tunkhannock, Wyoming county. On the program for the affair appears the names of Prof. Stewart, Prof. Watts, Prof. Myers, and Army and Hershey of the senior class, all of whom will deliver addresses before the meetings.

An educational train is to be run through Cumberland and Franklin counties over the Cumberland Valley railroad, early in March. It is to be conducted by the School of Agriculture.

The school of Agriculture and Experiment Station will hold a Farmers' Week at Greenville, Mercer county, during one week in March.

Thirteen station agents from the middle division of the P. R. R. visited the college in a body during Farmers' Week.

Professor Mairs lectured before the Teachers' Institute at Bellefonte.
