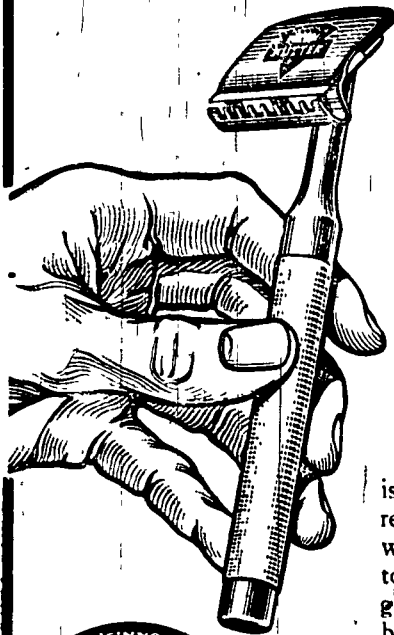

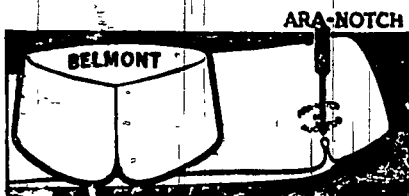
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State College Alumnus Honored.

In the Atlanta Constitution for December 19th, 1909, appeared the following item concerning Professor Harry P. Wood, a graduate of the Pennsylvania State College in the class of 1899, and assistant professor of electrical engineering in the same institution from 1901-1906:

"H. P. Wood, professor of elec

trical engineering at the Georgia School of Technology, has just been signally honored by appointment to membership on the educational committee of the American Institute of Electric Engineering, and has been elected chairman of the Atlanta section for the year 1910.

"Professor Wood was appointed by President Stillwell, of the American Institute, and received the news of his appointment from headquarters in New York.

"This committee is composed of but nine members, its personnel being made up of leading electricians located in various parts of the United States. It is thus apparent that to become a member is a decided honor.

"Prior to his election to the chair of electrical engineering at the Georgia Tech., Professor Wood was associate professor of electricity at the University of Illinois, and has a national reputation for high efficiency in his department."
