## The Senior Electrical Trip.

This year's senior electrical trip proved to be one of the most successful of lits kind ever taken'and those who accompanied Peotessor Kinsloe through the east have only the utmost praise to bestow upon it. The first point visited was the Baldwin Locomotive Works at Philadelphia, where the output of engines averages about twenty per week. The Christian St. Power Station in the same city was inspected following this, and while not an enormous plant is one of the most $\mu$ p-to-date
af innodern power plants. Next the Western Union Telegraph Company was visited and a study was made of their method of sending underground wires. At the New York Ship-building yards in Camden, the seniors saw the torpedo-boat destroyers under construction, one of which "was very" near completion. They next studied the methods of speed control used" by the West Jersey and Seashore Railroad at Camden and found this one of the most interesting \{eatures of the trip. Among the other many interesting places visited were the North American Building, Philadelphia, Roebling Wire Works, Camden, Nr J., Edison Lamp Works, Harrison, N.f., 59th Street station, New York City, Crocker-Wheeler Co., Ampere, N J., and New York Central Yards, New York, finally ending the trip by tre inspection of the ocean liner Baltic in New-York harbor.
