## H. C. McILVEEN

Our New Graduate Manager of Athletics is Also Head Coach for the Baseball and Football Teams.

"Henry Cooke" McIlveen '07, has assumed the duties of graduate manager of our athletic teams, to succeed George R. Meek '92 of Bellefonte, whose one year's career in that office has been marked with success. The appointment was made last March by the Alumni Athletic Committee and McIlveen started his work last fall at the opening of school. Mr. Meek was more than willing to turn over his position and all the information he had about the managership to the noted Penn State athlete and capable man whom we all know as "Mal."

Because it is possible for McIlveen to be right here at State College, the Alumni Association also had the former varsity pitcher, football halfback, and basketball forward appointed as head coach of the football and baseball teams. He confers with the various athletic managers on all matters relating to their offices and all schedules pass through his hands before being approved by the faculty. "Mal" has given up all intention of playing on any big league diamond this spring and besides his work as manager all his energies will be devoted to coaching the nine this spring just as he was head coach of football last fall with the popular and capable Hollenback as advisory coach.

No end of commendation can be given the Alumni Committee on the selection of such a man as McIlveen

to fill the important positions of graduate manager and head coach of football and baseball. "Mal" pitched the Blue and White nine to three consecutive victories over Princeton; on the gridiron he was a fleet, persistent, hard-working halfback and an excellent punter; he also won his "S" for splendid work on the basketball five. Surely he can successfully coach our athletic teams.

We are now fortunate enough to have a graduate manager who can be found in his office in the Carnegie Library at all times by the business men of our football, basketball, track and baseball teams. Athletic director Golden will now have a better opportunity to develop for State the kind of track aggregation a school of 1300 undergraduates merits and there should be nothing ahead for Old State but a continuation of the athletic success we have had for years back!

## "State" and International Arbitration.
