## Cornell Evens Up.

Cornell evened up some old scores at Ithaca last Saturday night when the Ithacans took over our five in one of the most bitterly-fought games ever indulged in by a Penn \$tate basketball, five. In '98 Capt. Sprecher's five won from Old Ezra 26 to 5 and two years: later Ruble's team repeated the trick, this time 18 to 8. Both those games were played at State College and they are the only basketball contests that are shown to have been played with the Ithacans in our athletic history, so that it was up to Cornell to regain lost laurels in last week's game.

The Carnelian-and-White triumphed finally, but only after a most stubborn battle had been put up by the sons of Old State. Cornell was never more than five points ahead and during most of the game the score was tied, yet our players never succeeded in going past the home team. The first half ended 13 to 9; then in the second period the score was tied at 15, when Captain Crosby secured a field goal, only to have the score evened up by Blythe on a pretty shot. In the final minute of play Crosby threw a foul goal and Bennett made a basket from the field which completed the scoring and gave Cornell a hard-earned vectory.

The play was rough but fast throughout. The teamwork on both sides was good yet the forwards were so well covered that no one shot more than two field goals during the strenuous halves. Our five showed "class" against about the strongest opponent she has met this year and there should be a different tale in

the remaining games with Allegheny, Bucknell, Dickinson, Princeton etc. The Cornell score:-
