Lincoln Day Speaker.

The speaker for the Lincoln Day exercises will be The Hon Clark E. Carr of Illinois, who will give a notable address, "With Lincoln at Gettysburg."

Few men now living so vividly link the past with the present as does Colonel Carr.; Born in the state of New York in 1836; he early removed to Illinois where in political matters he was associated both with Lincoln and Douglas. He was prominent on the local Committee of Arrangements for the Lincoln-Douglas Debate at Galesburg in 1858. As Illinois Commissioner on the Board at the time of the dedication of the battlefield at Gettysburg in 1863, Colonel Carr was able to observe the events of this memorable occasion and is prepared to speak authoritatively concerning them. His coming to Pennsylvania to relate his recollections of the day is, consequently, of more than pas sing moment He has also occupied prominent positions in diplomatic life and is the author of several books on historical and political topics.

## The Wrestling Meet.

Just about seven sturdy sons of Penn visited us here on January 22 and then returned to Philadelphia, somewhat discomfitted over the result of the trip to be sure, but ever hopeful for a future excursion. And while they were in our midst. State made history. The seven men re ferred to, were here for a purpose; they were wrestlers and all good ones; and they came to procure a victor's toga with which to drape the Red and Blue. As to what success they met with, any one of the 1000 students present at the meet can tell you. But let it be impressed on and ever remembered by, every State man, that the White and Blue team accomplished a feat on that evening that has never been equalled in intercollegiate wrestling history. State won seven straight bouts in just 47 minutes. The visitors were game, but outclassed at every turn and the victory, viewed from any point, was completely decisive. Our team showed the effects of its hard training and coaching, and it would be all but impossible, to witness a better exhibition of scientific wrestling. The judges gave excellent decisions, based purely on merit, and had little or no difficulty in awarding judgment. The one exception to this was the 175 pound bout between Lesh and Braddock, Penn's star end, and these two men were so evenly matched that it was necessary for them to wrestle two extra.
