Prospects for Wrestling Meets.

When director Golden was at Ithaca recently with our basketball five, coach Dugan of the Cornell wrestling team promised that our grapplers would be given a date with the Ithacans at Cornell within the next few weeks. When this date is settled, two wrestling matches will be arranged with Lehigh, one on the Armory floor and one at South Bethlehem. It is more than probable that Pennsylvania also will want a return match at Philadelphia, before the season is over. With the good start already secured by captain Brown's team, the students are enthusiastic over the mat athletes and some victories just as good as the Penn triumph should be annexed in the coming important meets.

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from feet to shoulders, strongly into play, especially those of waist line.

No. 9. Stand with feet together, bend slightly forward at hips and alternately bring knees to shoulder with smooth strong movement.

No. 10. Stand with feet together and hands on hips, hips firm. Describe from the waist line as large circle as possible, i. e. bend forward at hips, then with smooth strong continuous movement complete the circle from left to right four or eight times. The corresponding circle should always be from right to left with same counts. Right to left movement should always be taken last for reasons which will be given later.

No. 11. With hands grasping sides of chair seat, arms extended, jump feet back to full extension from shoulder to feet with hips firm. Drop chest easily to chair seat and then push up to full arm extension.

I will gladly explain any movement that is not made clear in this article and will be pleased to prescribe special exercises for special needs at any time.

Basketball and Track.

A few more home games, one more eastern trip and our basketball team will wind up its season. Swarthmore will meet the Blue and White on Feb. 18 and on the following day we will play Bucknell on our opponent's ground. The eastern trip will begin at Swarthmore on Feb. 24, and from there the team will go to New York to play the C. C. N. Y., after which Harrisburg A. C. will be played on the way home.

Manager Summer has not definitely arranged his track meet dates as yet but has selected and made arrangements with all the teams he intends to meet on the field during the coming season. On Beaver Field, we will have Swarthmore, Dickin-

son and a good commencement meet. Our opponents then have not yet been decided upon. Our team has been entered on the Harrisburg Intercollegiate, Pittsburg Intercollegiate and the quarter-milers in the Penn. days. The Indians will be contested at Carlisle and special efforts are being made to arrange a meet in which State, Swarthmore and possibly Lafayette will be combined and pitted against Penn.

There is also a big possibility that an interscholastic track meet, such as was held last year, will again be duplicated on New Beaver Field.

Just at present there are about seventy men in the track squad, and the coaches would greatly desire to see this increased to a hundred, so every man in college who can do any track work is strongly urged to come out.

Dr. McAllister Here.

A. S. McAllister, associate editor of the Electrical World and professorial lecturer of the School of Engineering, is lecturing three or four times a day to the junior and senior Electrical Engineers from Feb. 7 to 12 inclusive. Dr. McAllister gave the same series of lectures last year, when they proved of utmost value and interest to all the students specializing in Electrical Engineering.

Dr. McAllister was graduated from this college in 1898, after which he was connected with various industrial concerns, and took his higher degree and held a professorship at Cornell University. He has been connected with the editorial department of the Electrical World for the last few years.
