Up On Agricultural Hill.

The joint meeting of the Pennsylvania State Breeders' Association and the Pennsylvania Dairy Union of which Prof. Van Norman is secretary was held last week in the School of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Hunt and Professors Gardner, Kochel, Knoll and Hibschan attended. Prof Gardner judged the corn show.

The Pennsylvania Railroad will run a special educational train from Harrisburg to Altoona, including all branch lines, on Feb. 22 and 23.

Prof. Van Norman lectured last week at the Movable School of Agriculture at Allentown, and Prof. Larsen spoke at Erie. Prof. Agee lectured in Chester county.

Several additions have recently been made to the pure-bred live stock.

The Department of Agricultural Education has moved from the Agricultural Building to the Experiment station.

The college has recently effected an agreement for cooperation with the Bureau of Soils of the Department of Agriculture at Washington by which a detailed soils survey of Bedford, Bradford, Erie and Washington counties will be made. The Bureau of Soils will furnish four men for the work and the college will furnish the same number of men.

Prof. H. J. Wilder will be assigned to Pennsylvania to study fruit soils in this state.

The Reconnaissance Soils Survey of the state will be continued. Prof. Shaw has charge of the work

Another Free Lecture.

On Saturday evening, Feb. 12, Dr. Toyokichi Iyenoga, who lectured last year on "Picturesque Japan," will give an illustrated lecture in the free course, on "Peking." The capital of China is the center of a struggle at present between the old and new order of things and Dr. Iyenoga spent some time last year in a study of political conditions. He stops at State College en route from New York City, where he has been lecturing, to the State of Texas where he is to deliver a series of lectures on the Far East.
