

### Down Goes Bucknell!

Last Saturday night our basketball five gave Bucknell the most overwhelming defeat that has been handed the Lewisburgers in the history of the eleven floor games between these two institutions. Indeed Captain Hermann's team scored more points in the recent struggle than both teams together have scored in any single Bucknell State basketball contest in the past. Following is the way it happened in detail.

Kurtz scored from the foul line for the visitors before the ball had been in play a minute; referee Turner was just as much on the alert for fouling all through the game as he was in detecting this first infraction of the rules, so that his work proved to be eminently satisfactory. Kurtz made a second score for Bucknell on a field goal but the visitors' lead of three points was short lived. Reed scored twice from the field and Hermann added a point from the foul line. McEntire annexed a pretty basket at this time and proved a most worthy substitute for Shore right through; he was all over the floor and heady in his passing.

Fisher got Bucknell's second and last field goal during the first half and then followed a fusillade of accurate shots from the hands of our players. Hermann scored one each from field and foul; in quick succession came scores by Reed and Blythe, then Reed again and Blythe again. "Cholly" Amidon here broke into the game with a neat basket then came Hermann's third foul goal and McEntire's second field goal. Kurtz got one in from foul after missing on four trials and "Bill" Reed finished the half with a good shot after getting loose from two or three opponents. The Orange and Blue team left the floor badly winded and clearly outplayed, as the score of 25 to 6 for the first

half indicates.

The tally for the second period was State 27, Bucknell 7, making a final big total of 52 to 13. McEntire scored twice from field before Kurtz on a foul, got Bucknell's first point in the second half. Reed made his sixth basket and Hermann scored from foul; Blythe, Hermann, McEntire and Reed (with two) scored in rapid succession on well-aimed shots. Then Herman added a point, and McEntire and "Dutch" both scored from field before Bucknell was again heard from, Kurtz and Zehner making field goals at

this stage of the encounter.

When the score was 38 to 7, James Bok Batters broke around and played hard although he did not get into the scoring. This continued merely after the two visiting forwards had scored from field, Hermann made three points and Amidon scored again, then Kurtz got a basket on a long shot which was the final tally of the game. Our men played all around Bucknell in all departments of the game and in shooting displayed better work than has been seen in any other varsity game this year.



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
