Prof. Willard on Stellar Evolution.

Prof. Willard's illustrated lecture on Stellar Evolution, which was given on Saturday night, was one of the most appropriate and interesting lectures of the course. A lecture of this nature serves as a great benefit, not only on account of the interest being displayed concerning the appearance of Halley's Comet, but also on account of the general lack of knowledge of the heavenly bodies.

In part, Professor Willard spoke of the formation of the planets and the various theories concerning their origin, the different types of stars and the rate at which they travel. In order to give the audience a better idea of the planets, photographs taken by telescopic cameras were thrown on the screen. Among the slides used were photographs of star clusters, star clouds, the prominen-

ces occurring on the sun, and most important and interesting nebulae for study. In addition, the reappearance of Halley's Comet was explained together with the possible dangers connected with its coming into close proximity to the earth.

The Band Concert.

On account of the inclement weather, the band concert which was to be given Sunday afternoon

on the campus, took place in the Auditorium last Sunday evening. Under the able leadership of L. F. Meissner, Jr the program, consisting of seven selections by well known composers, was carried off in an excellent manner.
