In the course of the past week State has acquired new honor through the efforts of four men when, as a result of their laborious efforts, they downed Swarthmore and gained the coveted championship title of the Intercollegiate debating league of Pennsylvania. Three times has this feat been accomplished by a State debating team until now the time seems opportune to take some official action relative to bestowing some sign of recognition upon the men who are upholding the classical standard of the college by their splendid and educative work.

In the majority of universities throughout the country the varsity debaters are awarded some special insignia, just as the athletic teams are permitted to wear the college

letter, but for some unknown reason no advance has yet been made here to compensate our team for their praiseworthy work. Many suggestions could be offered as a means of recognition for these men, from the college in general, but it appears advisable that the best method of determining what this should be, is to have it brought before the student body for open discussion.

When you have an idle moment to yourself, why not take advantage of your opportunity to do something for your college, and turn your thoughts to a subject that has long been discussed without apparent result, namely, the composition of a good college song.
