Course in Architectural Engineering

The new catalog and bulletin of the School of Engineering contains a course in Architectural Engineering, which is a new feature of the catalog. This course may be considered preparatory to a more strictly professional postgraduate course to be obtained in Europe, America, or in an architect's office. It may also be considered as a basic preparation for entrance in the building or structural trades as a contractor or engineer.

The course contains the full amount of applied mechanics, physics, Engineering materials, Electrical and heat Engineering, chemistry and mathematics called for in the other engineering courses. It also includes the same work in language, history and the political sciences. The special work consists largely in the study of free hand drawing from cast and life, architectural history, the study of orders and architectural rendering; all of which forms the beginning of the preparation of the

student along the aesthetic side of architecture. In addition to this work, are suitable studies in mechanical drawing, descriptive geometry, shades and shadows, perspective, study in design of structures, and the preparation of working drawings. These studies, taken in connection with the engineering subjects named above, should give a young man intending to enter the lines suggested an unusually desirable foundation upon which to build.

The field for men who are prepared to solve the engineering problems of the great buildings of our cities and institutions, and encountered in the erection of industrial establishments, is large and not adequately filled. The creation therefore, of this course, which takes somewhat the position toward the profession of architecture that the new college course preparatory to medicine and law, which also appear in the catalog, hold in relation to those two professions.

To Celebrate Fiftieth Anniversary of College Orchard.

Soon after the College was established there was planted an orchard of several acres, primarily to furnish fruit for the students. This was fifty years ago and every student at "State" since that time has a warm spot in his heart for the "old orchard".

The fiftieth anniversary of its planting will be celebrated on May 6, to which every student and people from the surrounding country are invited to attend. Mr. Gabriel Heister, an alumnus of the college and now President of the State Horticultural Association will be present and give an address. Dr. Buckhout will give an historical sketch of the orchard and Mr. J. A. Runk '10 will tell of its relation to the student body.

The officers and members of the various county horticultural associations throughout the state have been given a special invitation to be present.

This celebration will be given in connection with the interscholastic meet. The program will be given in the orchard (weather permitting) beginning at 9:30 a. m., and accommodations will be furnished in the orchard where those who wish to do so may eat their lunches.

A demonstration session of pruning and spraying will be held in the afternoon.

A committee of senior and junior students have the arrangements in charge.
