## School of Mines.

As a part of the Extension work of the School of Mines, which is being carried on in co-operation with the coal mining institutes of the State, Dr. Crane spent several days during the week of Apr. 25-30, in the Anthracite Field. He lectured at Hazelton, Pittston, and Scranton, his subjects being, Waste in Mining, and Safe Methods of Drawing Pillars.

The Cyanide plant has been installed in the Metallurgical Laboratories and it is the intention to make a run during the present month. This plant is of large size and it is possible to use charges of 1000 pounds of ore. It is in all respects similar to commercial plants, and will afford opportunity for making large size tests of the extraction of gold from its ores under commercial conditions. The first run will be made using a low grade California gold ore from the North Star Mines, at Grass Valley California.

The Jos. Dixon Crucible Co. have sent a collection of their raw materials and products, to be placed as an exhibit in the Mining Museum. This collection includes samples of the raw graphite, various sorts of refined graphite, Crucibles, and other products which they manufacture.

Through the Generosity of the Pennsylvania Railroad Co. the Dept. of Geology has received a large number of photographs suitable for framing, and illustrating some of the striking geological features to be seen along this railroad.
