State Man Joint Inventor of an Important Labor Saving Machine.

One of the latest inventions for reducing the amount of labor necessary in watering coke in the ovens is an automatic watering machine, invented jointly by William L. Affelder, '99, superintendent of the H. C. Frick Company's Redstone plant at Brownfield, and Mark Gorton, master mechanic of the same plant. The merits of the machines were experimented with and the experiments proved highly successful. As a result a number of the machines have already been installed in many of the western coke plants.
