Extension Work Rapidly Forging to the Front and Proving Itself to be Marked Success.

The movement management inaugurated during the past two years for the purpose of extending and perfecting the extension of the sphere of influence and usefulness of the college has recently been put upon a firmer foundation than ever before, and is meeting with appreciation generally throughout the state. Plans for a still larger "University Extension" movement have been in the past week perfected for the coming year.

Beginning with the Agricultural Instruction train, under the supervision of Dean Hunt and Professor Agee, extending to the Departments of Engineering and of Mining, the work has been one of helpful in struction to men of many occupations in the diversified industries of the state. Next year trains similar to the successful enterprise of the Agricultural Department will be sent out upon the road by both the School of Engineering and the School of Mines and Metallurgy. Both the latter schools have been doing work outside of our college world to meet the demand for help coming from men who have not the means nor time for a college course; the School of Engineering in the apprentice schools at Williamsport and Altoona and the School of Mines by lectures and demonstrations given throughout the state. As yet, however, the work has not been organized regularly into an efficiently self conducting system embracing the needs of the people of the state generally, but it is hoped before long to perfect such an organization,

At a conference held last Monday between the President of the college. Deans of the Schools. and a party of officials of the Pennsylvania railroad, the question of the manner of conducting the work for the coming year was the chief topic of discussion. The Pennsylvania railroad men are particularly interested owing to the work done by the college instructors in the apprentice school at Altoona | and Williamsport, established this spring, and were so well pleased by it that it was decided to hold the school sessions the year' round, and open them to apprectices in their third year of work, as well as to the fourth year men. Owing to the obviou's restriction of time available to men'engaged in work at the same time, the instruction will not be the equivalent of a college course in engineering, still, it will prove itself of great value and doubtless will be a welcome help to those who have perhaps neither the money nor time to spare for an extended course. In addition, as mentioned above, the Engineering School will run an instruction train in full economy and smoke prevention over the railroad lines of the state, and the School of Mines will run an instruction train for miners, delivering illustrated lectures, performing practical ex-Continued on page 11
