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periments, and offering instruction to miners. The value of this latter work, though now is to be underestimated, is especially evident in the consideration of the number of mine accidents of recent occurrence, and if by precept and example the men in charge can do anything to lessen this continual drain upon the prosperity and happiness of the commonwealth, it deserves the highest praise and support in the pursuance of the ideal of public service which should be the highest goal of every institution of learning. The college is preparing to undertake a work of a magnitude unsurpassed by that of any school in the country.

Inter-class Debate Won by Sophomores.

The annual inter class debate held Friday night between the Freshmen and Sophomore debaters, resulted in a decisive victory for the Sophomores. The question selected for debate, was: Resolved, That Congress should immediately provide for the further strengthening of the Navy, and the Freshmen debaters consisting of H. W. Stiner, H. F. Kraybill, D. A. Matteson, with C. J. Higgs as alternate, upheld the affirmative while the Sophomore team composed of J. A. Kinney, G. M. DeHass, H. Mellinger, with J. Osura as alternate defended the negative side. Good, clear, and logical arguments were offered both pro and con, but the Sophomores proved to the judges beyond a doubt and with the most conclusive evidence that congress should not immediately provide for the strengthening of the Navy. In rebuttal, the affirmative were unable to satisfactorily break down the strong points set forth in the contentions of the negative and the Freshmen were thus forced to suffer the defeat, which they took in good spirit.
