"Flunk" Notices and Grade Reports

The Registrar wishes to announce that at the end of the Second Semester official notification of any failure in examination will be sent out as soon as the grade is received, and that such notices will be mailed to the student's State College address until Monday, June 13 inclusive; after that date these notices will be sent to the student's home address.

Any student who leaves State College on or before June 13 should, therefore, leave his summer address at the Postoffice, with a written request that his letters be forwarded. The Postmaster is required by law thus to forward letters upon request.

If any student intends to be at State College for a week or two after June 13, and wishes notice sent to his State College address after that date, he should leave a written request to that effect at the Registrar's Office.

If any student has changed his home address since he filled out his matriculation blank in the Registrar's Office, he should call at the office immediately and furnish the Registrar with his correct home address. This change of address should be attended to, not later than June 4.

There is little likelihood that these important notices will go astray if every student thus takes pains to have his letters sent to the proper address.

As heretofore, but a single grade report will be made out for each student at the end of the Second Semester, and this report will be mailed to the student's parents or guardian.

Prohibition Club.

At a meeting of the committee of the State College Prohibition Club, Jose Osuna of the class of 1912 was appointed as a representative to the Prohibition Oratorical Contest which is to be held at Harrisburg June 23 and 24, 1910. Eight other colleges of Pennsylvania have already entered this contest in which there are offered three prizes, \$50.00, \$25.00, and \$10.00 respectively for the best orations, on some phase of Prohibition.

It is hoped that a permanent organization of the State College Prohibition Club may be effected next year. With this end in view a meeting will be held sometime before commencement to which all of those interested in this movement are invited.

Baseball.

Last Friday our nine had the misfortune to have the Gettysburg game prevented by rain. The Penn game on May 11 was called off for a like reason so that two contests have been prevented by the elements this season as compared with six last year and eight in 1908. The players had just started to practice in preparation for the Gettysburg

battle when there commenced a steady drizzle which lasted all afternoon.
