LECTURE ON CHINA.

A Large Audience Gathers at Auditorium to Hear Dr. Edmunds.

The popularity which the free lecture course attained last year has by no means diminished as could be seen by the large crowd that turned out Saturday night to hear Dr. Edmunds give his free illustrated lecture on "China of To-day". Although Dr. Edmunds is keenly interested in the Canton Christian college he gave the audience a clearer conception of the progress made by the entire Chinese Empire in religion, education, politics and morals. There has been a gradual uplift going on in all of these important affairs that are necessary for the making of a strong nation into which China is bound to develop before many years.

The part that the Christian colleges are playing in developing China was especially emphasized by Dr. Edmunds and it is due greatly to them that such striking advances have been made in the past few years. By means of illustrations he was able to show how things existed a number of years ago and then in comparison the change brought about by present day conditions, notably along educational and engineering lines.

Next Free Lecture.

The second lecture of the free lecture course will be delivered in the Auditorium on Saturday evening, Nov. 12, by Georg Atwell Richardson, president of the Inter-collegiate Aeronautical Association of America. His subject will be "Flight" and will be illustrated with pictures of ancient and modern types of flying machines. Mr. Richardson comes from the University of Pennsylvania. It is hoped to organize a local branch of the association. Nearly every prominent college and university is now represented and Penn State should not lag behind in the very latest fad.
