State Men Again to the Front.

The August number of the "Proceedings of the American Society of Civil Engineers" contains an illustrated paper of about 150 pages on the new "Washington Passenger Terminal Station," at the city of Washington, by Wm. F. Strouse '87, who was the engineer in charge of this work for the Baltimore & Ohio railroad. Besides the handsome terminal building, the work involved the re-arranging of all passenger tracks entering Washington, the construction of new tracks, platforms, and a very large amount of other work.

In the same issue of the "Proceedings" is a similar paper on the "Long Island Approaches to the East River Tunnels," of the Pennsylvania railroad, by Mr. Geo. C. Clark, '92, who was in charge of this construction for the Pennsylvania railroad.

Both of these State men have been eminently successful in engineering work and their papers are valuable contributions to the engineering literature of the day.

Both men are members of the American Society of Civil Engineers, and it is noted that Mr. Clark has lately received the nomination for office of director, to represent district 1 (New York City), of this society. A nomination is equivalent to an election, as but one ticket is placed in the field.

The Deutscher Verein.

At the meeting of last Wednesday evening the principal feature was the talk given in German by Mr. Starke. A very prominent feature of the work of the Verein—the annual German play—has been pushed rapidly this year. The production is a three act comedy, written for sixteen characters, and it presents many amusing and exciting passages.
