Some Excellent Artists Will Appear. Dudley Buck Company Presents First Entertainment Nov. 5

One week from next Saturday evening we will have the opportunity of attending the first number of the entertainment course arranged by the Young Men's Christian Association. The Dudley Buck company, which is composed of five artists, will present the initial number, "A Musical Review," which contains Grand Opera selections, sacred numbers, special songs in costume, ladies' quartets, duets and trio's including baritone and southern melodies with banjo and guitar accompaniment.

Mr. Edward K. Macrum, the musical director and baritone soloist, has had a thorough musical training. He was a piano pupil for several years of Mme. Schiller, Dr. Gerrit Smith and Mr. Walter Hall were his instructors on the organ, and Mr. Macrum now occupies the position of organist in a prominent Fifth Avenue church. His vocal training has been under the leading New York teachers and he possesses a rich powerful voice.

The Dudley Buck company was organized as a musical attraction in March, 1909, and has made over one hundred appearances in New York and vicinity. Success was assured from the beginning, because the artists were selected by the management with the sole object in view of securing voices, which would give the best results in concerted and part-song numbers, and at the same time were artists versatile enough in their accomplishments to permit of a greatly varied program.

All the members have had extensive opera or concert experience, several of the young ladies formerly appearing with the College Singing Girls whom many of us had the pleasure of hearing last year.

A prominent feature of the program is, the grand opera selections specially arranged for this company, and coached by Mr. Dudley Buck, Jr. There are some well rendered sacred numbers and also old familiar "heart songs" given in the true spirit.

Several numbers have been specially written for this company. Mr. Edward K. Macrum takes part with the young women in some effective numbers from both grand and light opera.

To the fellows who have been here for a year or more, it is not necessary to say anything concerning the high standard of entertainments which are found in the Y. M. C. A. course. But to those fellows who have not yet had the opportunity of attending any of the numbers, we would suggest that they obtain their tickets at once.

The advance sale of tickets will continue until six o'clock next Wednesday evening. These tickets are sold for \$2.00 and may be obtained at any time at 273 Main. On Wednesday night from 6 to 8 o'clock at the Business office the regular sale of tickets will take place. The general admission tickets for the course are \$1.25; for reserved seats \$1.75.
