DUDLEY-BUCK CONCERT

Entertainment Was Splendidly Given. Excellent Vocal Work the Predominating Feature.

The first of the season's entertainments given in the Y. M. C. A. course, was presented on Saturday evening by the Dudley Buck Concert company. The members of the company,—Miss Katherine Galloway, Miss Victorine Hayes, Miss Olive Scholey, Miss Henrietta Turell, and Mr. Edward K. Macrum gave a well balanced program that was heartily received by the audience. Several of the numbers were enthusiastically applauded, and all were excellently presented. The opening selection, "My Hero," from "The Chocolate Soldier" was given with good effect by the entire company. Miss Turell's contraltosolo was most creditable; and the number following, consisting of various Grand Opera selections, was rendered with much life and spirit by the quartet. The baritone solo by Mr. Macrum, the Aria from Verdi's "Ernani," was also very good.

The company scored a decided success in "Tenting Tonight on the Old Camp Ground," by Kittridge, and "Take Care" by Froelich. The singing was in excellent harmony, and evenly balanced throughout. The solos by Miss Galloway and Miss Hayes were also well rendered,—"A Chinese Cracker," sung by the latter, being exceptionally interesting. The Hunting song by Kobbe, which closed the first half of the program, was most pleasing to the audience and called forth strong commendation.

At the opening of the second part of the entertainment the company gave with good effect "The Singing Girls," from "Little Denmark," and "The Singing Lesson," from "The Daughter of the Regiment." Miss Hayes and Miss Scholey sang most

acceptably "An Old Maid All My Life," also taken from "Little Denmark." An entertaining duet was heard in the "Letter Duet" from the "Chocolate Soldier", sung by Miss Hayes and Mr. Macrum. The "Fortune Telling Trio" from "Carmen," received excellent treatment by Miss Galloway, Miss Scholey, and Miss Turell. As a finale the entire company sang selections from National American songs. During the program the audience continually gave signs of pleasure and satisfaction, and it is generally felt that the first number of the course was a successful one.
