tely A number of amendments were made to the Constitution as first proposed, but finally the following was adopted

Art. I.—Name.

Sec. 1 The name of the organization shall be "The Student Council of the Pennsylvania State College"

Art II—Objects.

Sec. I. The object shall be: a To recommend, maintain, and regulate the customs and traditions of the college.

b To take such steps as may be advisable and necessary to support and carry into effect any policy to uphold the name of our college, and if necessary to cause the exclusion from the college, men who bring discredit to her name; and when requested, to investigate any appeal made by any student.

c. To promote a better mutual understanding between the faculty and the student body.

Art. III.—Membership.

Sec. I. The membership shall be limited to the two upper classes and shall consist of twenty five members. Fifteen to be from the senior class and ten from the junior class.

Sec. II. a. The members of the senior class shall be as follows: The senior President, and the remainder to be chosen from the different schools in proportion to the number of students in each school.

b The members from the junior class shall be as follows: The junior President, and the remainder to be chosen from the different schools in proportion to the number of students in each school

Sec. III. The time of election shall be at the same time as the election of officers and those men receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

Sec. IV. The term of office shall be one year.

Art. IV.—Duties of Members.

Sec. I. It shall be the duty of each member to attend all meetings and to vote upon all matters brought before the council, except when he is excused by the council because he is personally interested in the case.

Art. V.—Officers.

Sec. I. The officers shall be:

- A. President.
- B. Vice President.
- C. Secretary.

Sec. II. a. The president of the senior class shall be President.

b. The president of the junior class shall be vice president.

c. The secretary shall be elected at its first meeting by a majority vote

Art. VI --Meetings.

Sec I The regular meetings of the council shall be on the second Tuesday of each month, but the president shall have power to call a meeting at any time and shall be required to call a meeting at the written request of any ten members of the two upper classes

Sec II. The records of all meetings shall be accessible to any student.

Art. VII -- Powers of the Council

Sec I. The council shall consider and act upon such matters as may be brought before it by the President of the college, by the Faculty, or by any student

Sec III. The council shall have the power to summon any student
