to appear before it and to conduct such investigations as it may deem just and proper.

Sec. III. Upon any investigation held before the council any member of the Faculty may be requested to attend as a witness or to aid the council in such matters.

Sec. IV. a. The council shall have the power to discipline or dismiss any student, subject to the approval of the Faculty, if any appeal be taken.

b. No student shall be publicly dismissed without the consent of the President of the College.

Sec. V. Any vacancy occurring in this council shall be filled within two weeks after such vacancy shall occur, and in the same manner in which the office was previously filled.

Sec. VI. Any member of this council may be expelled from this council by a vote of two-thirds of the members, for misconduct or neglect of duties.

Sec. VII. The council shall have authority on eligibility of contestants in all class contests.

Sec. VIII. The council shall have authority to regulate the time of all class contests.

Sec. IX. All actions of the council shall be final except in cases relating to college customs, in which case must be approved by the majority of the members present at a meeting of the two upper classes.

Art. VIII.—The Student Board.

Sec. I. The Student Council shall provide for a Student Board to convey to the President of the college such actions as the Council shall deem necessary.

Sec. II. The Student Board shall consist of the President of the Senior class, two members from each of the two upper classes, and the President of the Sophomore class.

Sec. III. The President of the Senior class shall be President of the Student Board.

Sec. IV. The members of this Board shall be chosen by the council members of their respective classes, immediately after the election of the council.

Art IX.

Sec. I. This Constitution may be amended by a majority vote of the members present at a meeting of the two upper classes.

By Laws.

1. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be used in governing the meetings of this council except as they may conflict with this Constitution and By-Laws.

2. The President of the Council shall preside at all meetings he shall appoint all committees and he shall preside at all Mass Meetings of the students which are called by the Council.

3. The President of the Council shall have the right to vote in all matters that come up before the Council.

4. The Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President.

5. Fifteen members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Council.

6. No student shall be dismissed without proper trial by jury, composed of members of the Council.

7. These By-Laws may be amended by a majority vote of the members present, at a meeting of the two upper classes.

Mining Engineering News.

Mr. A. G. Morse, representing the American La France fire engine company, of Elmira, N. Y., will lecture before the Engineering Society of the School of Mines, Wednesday Evening March 8, 1911. The lecture will be on mine fires and methods of fighting them, and will be, illustrated.

Dean W. R. Crane, of the School of Mines, will spend the greater part of the two weeks, beginning Monday Mch. 6, giving a series of lectures throughout the bituminous coal mining field.

The subject of his lecture will be Mines gases and their relations to Mine fires and Mine explosions. Lectures will be given as follows; Mch 6, Monongahela City; 7, Charleroi, 8, Fayette City; 9, Brownsville, 10, Uniontown, 11, Scottdale; 13, South Fork; 14, Portage; 15, Windber.

Engine Tests.

On Thursday and Friday of last week an acceptance test was made on two high speed steam engines, manufactured by the Valley Iron works, of Williamsport. The main points brought out in the trial were the water rate at various loads, the maximum capacity, the engine suction, and the speed regulation.

The engines were tested for the U. S. government and the interests of the government were looked after by Mr. P. M. Anderson, Electrical and Mechanical Engineer, of the department of the quarter-master general, Washington D. C.

Professors Harding and Gill, assisted by Professor Calderwood and Messrs. Brownscombe, Romanelli and Rowe of the Mechanical Engineering department represented the Valley Iron works.
