Death of Dr. Hitchcock.

On February 15, in Amherst, Mass., there passed away, at the tipe age of eighty-two, the man who made possible American athletics, Dr. Edward Hitchcock. '

He devised the system of anthropological measurements which is used today in all colleges in America and in many foreign institutions, and which has been known as the "Amherst Idea." In 1885 he helped found the American association for the advancement of physical education. For the first three years he was its president and for ten more years he served on its national counsel

In 1901 this organization gave a dinner in his honor and passed the following resolution: "We express our judgment that the long continued and high place that has been given to physical training at Amherst has been one of the strongest factors in securing for physical training its présent status in educational circles."

In 1905 the same association voted him an honorary member, together with Dr. Sargent of Harvard, the Crown Prince of Sweden, Prof. Angelo Mosso of Turin, Italy. and Prof. F. S. Schmidt of Bonn, Germany.

In this connection it may not be amiss to recall that the first intercollegiate baseball game was played as far back as 1859, between Amherst and Williams with a score 73 to 32 in favor of Amherst.

Vincent, presidentelect of the University of Minnesota in his witty, rapid-fire, and brilliant lecture on the "Physcology of the Crowd," captivated the large audience last Saturday night in the Auditorium to the, extent that few will forget this entertaining speaker. In dealing with this subject which appeared to be a serious one, Dr. Vincent approached it in such a manner that he made clear to the most stupid the principles of psychology.
