**FRESHMEN WIN.**

**Interclass Debate—Great Spirit Shown in Annual Contest.**

Last Saturday night in the Auditorium the class of 1914 met and defeated the class of 1913 in an annual interclass contest. In this "scrap", however, brain and not brawn was the prime requisite for victory.

The contest was a debate of the question Resolved, That the third class cities of Pennsylvania should adopt the short ballot system of voting.

The Sophomore class was represented by H. R. Rosen, of Philadelphia, Pa., H. P. Young, of Easton, Pa., R. E. Atkinson, of Newtown, Pa., and D. W. Atkinson, of Newtown, Pa., as alternate.

The Freshmen debaters were J. P. Rossiter, of Erie, Pa., W. H. Bullock, of Plainfield, Pa., M. Horst, of Schaefferstown, Pa., and C. S. Adams, of Eskeny, Pa., as alternate.

E. A. Cottrell, as chairman of the evening, read the question and showed its timeliness and importance by stating that there is at present a bill pending in the House of Representatives that provides for a short ballot system of voting in the cities of our state.

Mr. Rosen was introduced and opened the debate for the affirmative by giving the history and explaining the phraseology and exact meaning of the question. He also pointed out some merits of a short ballot system of voting.

Mr. Rossiter opened the debate on the negative and proved that a

short ballot system of voting was necessary in Pennsylvania. He further showed that the system now exist they do not do the present system of voting.

Mr. Young resumed the argument for the affirmative and contended that the proposed system would simplify politics, that it would result in electing better men to office, and that the public officers would be more directly responsible to the people for their conduct in office.

Mr. Bullock, as second debater on the negative, presented the argument that the existing evils would not be rectified under the short ballot system. Some minor changes were proposed by him, which were to be inserted with the system now in use.

The closing speaker for the affirmative, Mr. R. E. Atkinson, brought out in the course of his speech that the system advocated would be effective, that it is practical; and that it is adaptable to the third class cities of our state.

The debate was closed on the negative by Mr. Horst, who brought to the attention of the judge, in a forceful and convincing way that a system of voting by short ballot would be unsafe, and that the proposed change was radical in the limits of its provisions.

After a short intermission, during which the debaters were allowed to prepare for rebuttal, the teams again took places at their respective tables, the Freshmen being greeted by an inspiring class yell. Eight minutes were allowed each man for rebuttal and every member of the teams came back with refutation with a vim and vigor that proved his spirit to be of the fighting kind.

The three judges, Prof. Fred L. Pattee, Mr. J. F. Jones and Mr. M. J. Curl were asked not to confer one with the other but to cast their vote for the team which, in their estimation, had gained the best of the argument. Intense interest held the attention of everyone present as these ballots were read. The entire audience gave vent to its pent up feelings in a ringing round of applause when the decision was known to be unanimous for the negative.

It was not a large audience that had collected to hear the debate, but it was an interested and responsive one. More than one hundred members of the class of 1914 were in attendance while the men of 1913 were very few in number.

Prof. Fred L. Pattee, on being asked for his personal opinion of the contest, said that the Freshmen gave marked evidence of more preparation and a clearer insight into the question. They presented stronger arguments in a more forceful manner than their opponents. Taken all in all, he declared the debate one which reflected credit on everyone concerned.
