STATE NOT ADMITTED TO I. W. A.

Cornell Casts the Only Dissenting Vote Against Our Petition.

At the recent meeting of the Intercollegiate wrestling association, the Pennsylvania State College was denied admittance. At the time of the meeting at Princeton before Easter the unanimous feeling of those present was that we be admitted, but Cornell and University of Pennsylvania were sent with instructions not to vote and hence did not feel at liberty to admit us that time. They said however, that they would use all possible influence with their home committee and report at the next meeting. At the final vote, Cornell was still against us, while all the other colleges were in our favor. The only reason given for Cornell's action was that their advisory committee did not deem it wise at this time, and gave no further explanation. Letters have been received by "Pop" Golden from several of the colleges expressing their regret that we were not admitted into the association and hoped that we would try again next year, with better success. A big factor in our favor was the praise bestowed upon us by Columbia and Pennsylvania on account of the courtesy, good fellowship, and spirit shown their teams while at Penn State.

Two years ago some of the alumni of Amherst College raised one thousand dollars for a portrait of Professor E. P. Harris who for forty years was the head of the department of chemistry at that college. The portrait, painted by E. B. Child of New York, is now finished and Professor Pond will make the presentation to the college at the coming commencement.

Six Persons Confirmed.

On Whitsunday, June 4th, at the early morning service of St Andrew's church, six persons were advanced to the communion of the church by the rite of the laying on of hands. The Rt. Rev. James Henry Darling-ton officiated.

On Trinity Sunday, June 11th, the evening prayer service will be held at the usual hour, four o'clock, in the foyer.

Soccer. Football.

The sophomore and freshman classes meet in their annual soccer football game on Monday at 3 30 p. m. on New Beaver Field. This is only the second soccer football game that has been played at Penn State, the other game being played last Commencement between a team made up of 1910 and 1912 men, opposed by a team made up of men from the classes of 1911 and 1913. The game was very interesting from beginning to end and resulted in a tie game 0-0. Several men that were in the game last year will be on the sophomore team this year. The time of the game has been set forward to the time which was set for the baseball game with the University of Virginia, which was never really scheduled, negotiations merely pending for a contest on that date. Graduate Manager Thomas had the game put on the Commencement program in hopes that we would be able to schedule it, but negotiations fell through. The soccer game will be played in its stead. This event will be a regular interclass scrap and on this account should be of special interest to the two lower classes as well as the Commencement guests.

Summer Session for Teachers.

The work in the teachers' summer session, inaugurated last year for the purpose of giving instruction to the teachers of the state in agriculture, domestic science, manual training, and general education, begins June 26 and ends August 4. Last year, one hundred forty-seven teachers from thirty-six counties took advantage of the courses offered. Forty-five different subjects were elected and certificates of credit were received by one hundred thirty-two teachers. Instruction is given by members of the faculty of this college.

The popularity of the session for the coming year has exceeded the hopes of those in charge. Twice the number of teachers who attended last year have already been enrolled for the work this summer. The regular work, exercises, lectures, and entertainments have been of such a nature as to make the session grow to be a profitable and pleasant period of study.

Track Meet With Colgate.

This afternoon at 1 00 p. m. State meets Colgate in a dual track meet on New Beaver field. Colgate should make the meet interesting for State, their men winning consistently in many meets of the season. Colgate cleared up the New York state Intercollegiate by seventy points and also defeated Bucknell in a dual meet by the score of 90-22 with only two places counting. At the intercollegiate at Harvard this year, the high hurdles was run in 161 seconds while the Colgate man made it in 153 seconds at New York. Their quarter miler is making 51.1 sec. and it can plainly be seen that if State wants to win her men will have hard work ahead of them.

Locker Keys

Dr. Moore will attend the meeting of the British Association for the advancement of Science, and will present a paper on "The siliceous Oolites and other concretionary structures to be found in the vicinity of State College, Pa."

Dr. W. R. Crane, Dean of the School of Mines, and Professor and Mrs. C. P. Linville, are attending the fiftieth anniversary meeting of the American Institute of Mining Engineers, at Glen Summit, near Wilkesbarre, this week.

Thursday evening Freshman Advisor Prof. Fehr, with the assistance of Miss Fehr, Miss Simmonds and Mrs. Pond, entertained his group of 40 freshmen at his residence, and introduced them to their future Dean, Dr. Pond.

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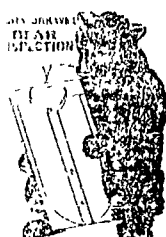
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
