Testimonial to Life of Gabriel Hiestler.
 At a meeting of the Board of Trustees held January 23, 1912, the following was ordered spread upon the minutes and a copy sent to the Collegian:
 The Providence that rules the universe and the destinies of man called from the activities of this life Gabriel Hiestler, of Harrisburg, on Friday, January 19, 1912.
 Mr. Hiestler was born Apr. 28, 1850, at the Hiestler homestead "Esther-ton" along the Susquehanna, which was his life-long residence. His parents were Augustus Otto and Catherine Cox Hiestler, and his grandfather was Gabriel Hiestler, a Revolutionary war officer. Reared on the farm, he secured his early education at the Harrisburg Academy, graduating from that institution in 1866. The same year he entered The Pennsylvania State College and graduated with the class of 1868. He married, October 4, 1871, Annie E. Maurer, of Harrisburg, and they had one son, A. Otto, now living at Buffalo, N. Y., and two daughters, Nancy, married to Francis Bird Dutton, living at Lebanon, Pennsylvania, and Sarah, living at home.
 Mr. Hiestler ranked as a leader in scientific agriculture and horticulture, serving many years as President of the State Horticultural Society, which office he held at the time of his death. He was recognized as the foremost fruit grower of the State, having been awarded medals at the Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo, the World's Fair at Chicago and the Paris Exposition.

He was a Trustee of The Pennsylvania State College from 1879 to his death and served most efficiently and acceptably on many of the committees. Always thoroughly in earnest, absolutely dependable, and a staunch friend of the Institution, the absence of his genial presence and loyal support will be keenly felt and deeply regretted by his colleagues and all who knew him.
 The Board of Trustees desire to place upon record this testimonial of their appreciation of the life and services of their deceased friend and fellow member and to extend to the bereaved family their fullest sympathy.
