The Third Summer Session for Teachers.

The Third Summer Session for teachers will open the second Monday following Commencement. Attendance is limited to teachers and prospective teachers in Pennsylvania. For those who are teaching in Pennsylvania, a nominal registration fee of \$5 admits to all classes and lectures.

The first session, held two years ago, had 146 teachers enrolled. Last summer 215 teachers were present. There is every indication that the third session will show a substantial increase in enrollment.

Forty instructors will offer courses in nearly one hundred different subjects. The State Free Library Commission will offer a course in Library Instruction for teachers. Practically every advanced subject required for a State Permanent Certificate may be found in the list of subjects included.

A large part of the work offered the Summer Session may be conducted, under certain specified conditions, by correspondence. Credit given for all work satisfactorily completed.

Not the least important feature of the session will be the public lectures given by such men as Dr. Russell Lowell, Dr. Frederick Poole, Dr. Witmyer, and others, the side pleasure excursion trips, and the sports organized during the session. **McAllister Hall** will again be specially equipped for the use of women students. Old Main will provide ample accommodations for men students. Every effort will be put forth to make those in attendance comfortable and happy.

Statement of the Proposed Hazing Regulations.

As there seems to be a great amount of misunderstanding concerning the proposed hazing regulations, and the functions of the committee, the following is presented to each student so that any misunderstanding may be cleared up.

(1) Nothing is abolished except indiscriminate hazing (by indiscriminate hazing is meant all "round ups" and any hazing which is not done on account of the breach of customs, or for overbearing behavior). All college customs that have been observed heretofore are to be observed with this single exception.

(2) The committee is elected so that the decision of the class is placed in the hands of responsible men rather than in the hands of men that are not so representative of their class.

(3) The committee receives complaints against freshmen, from any member of the three upper classes. It sits as a board and hears the complaints against the offenders and his defense. If they decide that the freshman has failed to observe college customs or has been offensive in any way, they turn him over to the sophomore class to be hazed. If on the other hand they find the complaint to be unjust or merely a personal grudge, they dismiss the freshman.

(4) The committee as a body does absolutely no hazing. They may however take part in any hazing as an individual member of the sophomore class.

In the last mass meeting of the year Jonas Blank, 1913, was elected secretary of the Athletic Association.

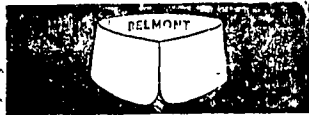
